Manager's Article: Sustaining A Reliable Electric System by Jenny Stryhn

We've all heard the phrase, "Don't put all your eggs in one basket." This popular adage is often used in conversation or a story when someone is about to do something foolish or risky. If they heed this advice, it means they did not commit to "one basket", but instead hedged their bets with multiple options.

This strategy is how I describe Agralite's common sense approach to the current energy transition. 1623800 We know that consumer interest in renewable energy continues to grow. We've seen this trend here in Minnesota.



Recent innovations and advances in renewable energy technologies have led to sharp decreases in costs, making renewables more feasible, accessible and scalable. Over the last few years, Agralite Electric Cooperative has adjusted our fuel mix by utilizing more renewables, and today, just over 40% of our fuel mix is comprised of renewable energy, the majority of which is hydropower and wind.

Nationally, there is increasing reliance on renewable energy sources at the same time that we're seeing fossil fuel plants taken off-line, often ahead of schedule. Additionally, we're seeing more pressure on the electric grid due to the increasing frequency and intensity of severe weather events and rising electricity demand.

Competing Pressures

So how do we reconcile these challenges of grid pressure and a changing fuel mix? Solar and wind energy are certainly beneficial for the environment, but they are limited resources because the sun does not always shine, and the wind does not always blow. Our primary responsibility is to provide electricity 24/7 to you and our community. To do this, we need reliable sources of power that will meet all the peaks and valleys of on-demand energy in our connected world.

So where are we netting out? That's where our familiar adage comes into play. While utilization of renewables is increasing, we still need to incorporate other forms of energy in the mix to ensure reliable service. Remember, solar and wind are intermittent power sources. This fact coupled with the growing demand for renewables creates its own challenges.

That's why we spread our eggs into multiple baskets. There is great value in maintaining a diverse mix of fuel sources--fossil fuels and renewables to ensure reliability, resiliency and meet the growing demand for electricity.

Reliability also means repairing and replacing utility equipment to prevent wear-andtear, ensuring our equipment can withstand severe weather. We are laser-focused on providing our Agralite Electric Cooperative members with safe, reliable, affordable energy. That's why fuel diversity--or placing our eggs in multiple baskets--is essential to reliability.

The Bottom Line

Lowering the overall carbon footprint in this country means we're going to electrify more and more of our economy. Solar and wind power are an important part of a broader energy portfolio, but they are not available 24/7. In today's ever-connected world, people need power around the clock.

As our nation increasingly depends on electricity to power the economy, Agralite Electric Cooperative is working to anticipate, plan and respond to market trends and policy shifts. That's how we can power your home and our economy, while continuing to serve as your local energy provider.



Director Nominations Now Open For Districts 5, 6, & 7

District 6 includes the townships of: Tara, Clontarf, Benson, Marysland, Six Mile Grove, Torning, Swenoda, and Mandt. 1628100

District 7 includes the townships of: Hegbert, Fairfield, Shible, Moyer, Appleton, Edison, West Bank, Artichoke, Upper Akron, Lower Akron, Stevens, Synnes, and Kragero.

LEC Teacher Seminar Is June 12-15 In Bismarck, ND

The Lignite Energy Council (LEC) is conducting the 2023 Teacher Seminar, "Energy, Economics and Environment," at the Bismarck State College in Bismarck, ND, June 12-15, 2023. Basin Electric will pay for travel costs for teachers from SD, MN, MT, WY and IA, and LEC will cover the rest.

This seminar will provide teachers with the information and educational materials needed to teach about how lignite is mined and used to produce electricity for homes, farms and businesses in the Upper Midwest. The seminar also covers lignite's economic impact on the region and important environmental issues affecting the lignite industry.

Two grad professional development credits are available through the Center for Economic Education at the University of North Dakota, Grand Forks, ND, North Dakota State University, Fargo, ND or Minot State University, Minot, ND.

Teachers can apply online: *www.lignite.com/teachers*

Applications are accepted until the seminar is full or until April 28.

A \$60 deposit is required to reserve each teacher's spot, and can be submitted online. This deposit will be returned when they check in at the seminar.

Applications are accepted on a firstcome, first-served basis. While LEC encourages all educators and admin staff to apply and attend, preference is given to:

- 4th-12th grade teachers
- Science, math or social studies teachers
- Career counselors
- Principals and vice principals

Teachers must track their mileage and individual meal expenses (up to two each way) from home to the seminar and back. Packets with travel expense reimbursement forms will be given to the teachers at the seminar. Receipts for meals are required.

<u>Reimbursement forms are due July</u> 7, 2023.

Work Zone Awareness Week Sheds Light On Safety

National Work Zone Awareness Week, April 17–21, 2023, is a good time to learn more about work zone safety; however, work zone safety should be observed 365 days a year to save lives.

Cars or trucks that speed through a work zone not only endanger workers on the ground. Driving too fast or too close to a work truck can also put an elevated worker in danger by causing their raised bucket to move or sway.



Streets and highways are lined with power poles and electrical equipment, and narrow roadways often require crews like ours to place their equipment in or near traffic lanes. Be alert to utility and other work zone crews for their safety and yours. Besides our crews, you might encounter road workers, other utility crews, tree trimmers or first responders working in or on the side of the road.

According to the National Work Zone Safety Information Clearinghouse, 774 fatal crashes and 857 deaths occurred in work zone crashes in 2020. Many other work zone crashes result in injuries. 994300 In 2020, 102,000 work zone crashes occurred.

To help keep roadside crews safe:

- Keep a safe distance between your vehicle and traffic barriers, trucks, construction equipment and workers.
- Be patient. Traffic delays are sometimes unavoidable, so allow time for unexpected setbacks.
- Obey all signs and road crew flag instructions.
- Merge early and be courteous to other drivers.
- Use your headlights at dusk and during inclement weather.
- Minimize distractions. Avoid activities such as texting, operating a radio, applying makeup or eating.

Remember, slow down when approaching a work zone and move over for first responders and work crews. Do your part to help everyone return home safely at the end of the day.



COLD WEATHER RULE & ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM NOTICE

In accordance with Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule, electric service cannot be disconnected for nonpayment between October 1 and April 30 if electricity is the primary heat source and ALL of the following statements apply:

- Your household income is at or below 50% of the state median household income. Income may be verified on forms provided by Agralite Electric Cooperative or by the local energy assistance provider.
- You enter into and make reasonably timely payments under a payment agreement that considers the financial resources of the household.
- You receive referrals to energy assistance, weatherization, conservation, or other programs likely to reduce your energy bills from Agralite Electric Cooperative.

Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule does not completely stop winter disconnects

Before disconnecting electric service to residential members between October 1 and April 30, Agralite Electric Cooperative must provide:

- A 30-day notice of disconnection;
- A statement of members' rights and responsibilities;
- A list of local energy assistance providers;
- Forms on which to request Cold Weather Rule protection; and
- A statement explaining available payment plans and other options to continue service.

Energy Assistance Program

The Energy Assistance Program (EAP) is a federally funded program through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, which helps low-income renters and homeowners pay for home heating costs and furnace repairs. Household income must be at or below 50% of the state median income (\$58,793 for a family of four) to qualify for benefits. Applications must be received or postmarked by May 31, 2023.



The Rising Cost Of Utility Materials Is Industry-Wide

As mentioned in the newsletter last fall, Agralite Electric Cooperative is working with Power System Engineering to review its cost and revenue needs through a Cost-of-Service study. The electric rates for the cooperative have been constant since the last rate change in January of 2017. Since then, the cooperative has faced increased pressures of wholesale power supply increases over the last six years, inflationary pressures on the cost of materials, and increased labor and fuel costs.

As part of the study, Power System Engineering has been reviewing all classes of energy users and have been identifying ways to protect the fiscal health of the Cooperative, while maintaining safe and reliable service. 1338200 Once the study is complete in the next month, Agralite Electric Cooperative will update you, our memberowners of the complete results, and the best options for the cooperative moving forward to manage increases while continuing to provide safe, reliable electric power to our membership.

The financials were given by Ralph with a PowerPoint presentation.


Tom Hoffman, Manager of Engineering & Operations, reported on activities of his department
