### Agralite Donates \$5,800 To Local Food Shelves During Minnesota FoodShare Month

Here at Agralite, we are always proud of what our Operation Round Up program does for our four-county region. In March, Operation Round Up donated to all four of our local food shelves in Big Stone, Pope, Stevens, and Swift counties.

The Board of Directors at Agralite created a board policy to contribute unclaimed capital credit dollars to Agralite's Operation

Round Up. A portion of those dollars go directly to our local food shelves, totaling \$5,800 for the month of March.

These dollars were delivered during Minnesota FoodShare month. During the March Campaign, donations are matched by Minnesota Food Share. The amount of matched dollars received is based on a percentage of how much was raised in the county. The more dollars raised, the more matching funds received.

If you haven't yet considered signing up for Operation Round Up, it's never too late! On average, Agralite members contribute about \$6 a year. A little goes a long way!

Spring has sprung and summer is right around the corner. Trees are starting to bud and the grass is starting to green up after some much-needed rain over the past week. However, even as I type, the forecast is saying a slight chance of a flurry of snow today is possible. But as Minnesotans, we have become accustomed to changing weather.

Spring time and summer in Minnesota also make conditions right for dangerous thunderstorms. These potential weather events can cause damages to our electrical system, but I want you to know that Agralite Electric Cooperative crews are ready and standing by to respond 24 hours a day/7 days a week should power outages occur in our service area.

When a storm knocks out power, our line crews take all necessary precautions before they get to work on any downed lines. I would encourage you to also practice safety and preparedness to protect your family during major storms and outages.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency recommends the items below as a starting point for storm and disaster preparedness, but you can visit www.ready.gov for additional resources.

- Stock your pantry with a three-day supply of non-perishable food, such as canned goods, energy bars, peanut butter, powdered milk, instant coffee, water and other essentials (i.e., diapers and toiletries). 874500
- Confirm that you have adequate sanitation and hygiene supplies including towelettes, soap and hand sanitizer.
- Ensure your first aid kit is stocked with pain relievers, bandages and other medical essentials, and make sure your prescriptions are current.
- Set aside basic household items you will need, including flashlights, batteries, a manual can opener and portable, battery-powered radio or TV.
- Organize emergency supplies so they are easily accessible in one location.


In the event of a prolonged power outage, turn off major appliances, TVs, computers and other sensitive electronics. This will help avert damage from a power surge, and will also help prevent overloading the circuits during power restoration. That said, do leave one light on so you will know when power is restored. If you plan to use a generator, make sure it's rated to handle the amount of power you will need, and always review the manufacturer's instructions to operate it safely and make sure a qualified electrical contractor installs the generator.

I would suggest you consider installing a standby generator, especially if you have confinement livestock facility or critical electrical loads at your location. If you would be interested in a standby unit, please contact our office for information on these units.

After the storm, avoid downed power lines and walking through flooded areas where

power lines could be submerged. Allow ample room for utility crews to safely perform their jobs, including on your property. I will emphasize again to stay clear of downed power lines as today I read of a girl who died following a contact with a downed electrical line in Florida following severe weather in the state.

I hope we don't experience severe storms this summer, but we can never predict Mother Nature's plans. At Agralite Electric Cooperative, we recommend that you act today because there is power in planning. From our co-op family to yours, we hope you have a safe and wonderful summer!

### Practice Safety When DIY-ing

These days many of us are spending more time at home and finding new, creative ways to enhance our living space. Tackling do-it-yourself (DIY) projects for the home can be fun and cost-effective, so why not roll up those sleeves and get started! Whether you're painting the front door with a fresh hue or finally upgrading those patio lights, successfully completing a DIY home project is incredibly satisfying. But many of these projects do not come without risks. Here are a few safety tips to keep in mind as you get to work. Remember, you should only tackle DIY home projects within your skill and <u>comfort level</u>. For projects that require extensive electrical work, we strongly recommend you hire a licensed, qualified electrician for assistance.

1 Start by selecting a designated work area. The amount of space you'll need will depend on the size and scope of your project, but make sure you have adequate lighting and ventilation (if necessary). Required tools and equipment should be located in your workspace and organized for easy access.

2 Personal protective equipment (PPE) is your friend. We know you're a pro, but investing a few bucks in PPE is essential for most home projects. 1418300 Stock up on safety goggles, dust masks, ear plugs (or noise reduction ear protectors), gloves and any other kind of protection you'll need for your project. Remember to wear appropriate clothing and shoes. (Ditch the sandals for this!)

3 Work slowly and clean as you go. When you rush through a DIY project, you'll likely end up with less desirable results than you intended, or worse, you could make a costly or dangerous mistake. Take your time and remember that you are in control of the project. You should also clean as you go to ensure a safer workspace. Pick up any scrap materials, tools that aren't in use and any tripping hazards.

**4 Be cautious with power tools.** Annually, 8% of electrocutions in the U.S. are attributed to improper use of power tools. The Electrical Safety Foundation International offers the following safety tips:

- Use ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) with every power tool to protect against electrical shock.
- If a power tool trips a safety device while in use, take the tool to a manufacturer-authorized repair center for service.
- Use extreme caution when cutting or drilling into walls where electrical wires or water pipes could be accidentally touched or penetrated.
- Do not use power tools without the proper guards.
- When using a wet-dry vacuum cleaner or a pressure washer, be sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions to avoid electrical shock.
- Never use power tools near live electrical wires or water pipes.

### Agralite Records 2020 Capital Credit Allocation

As a cooperative, Agralite allocates capital credits each year based on how much electricity each member purchased during the year. At the end of the fiscal year, the amount of your capital credits allocated for that year is listed on your bill, which went out this past month.

Capital credits are normally retained by the cooperative for a number of years and used as operating capital. Once the Board of Directors deems appropriate, they approve the refund of these capital credits. As a perk of being a member owner of Agralite Electric Cooperative, you get money back. That's the power of the cooperative membership!

### **MAY IS NATIONAL ELECTRICAL SAFETY MONTH**

To stay safe around electricity, start with these **SEVEN** basic tips:



DON'T OVERLOAD OUTLETS OR CIRCUITS Plugging in too many items or drawing too much power on a circuit can cause overheating, fire, and damage to devices.

DON'T USE FAULTY ELECTRICAL CORDS OR PLUGS Do not use cords that look frayed, worn or cracked. Do not use broken plugs. Never remove the grounding pin from a three-pronged plug.







#### BE CAREFUL AROUND H<sub>2</sub>0

Never use electricity while standing in damp or wet conditions. Keep all electrical devices away from water, including cell phones that are charging.

EVALUATE YOUR APPLIANCES

Do not use appliances in disrepair. Older or broken appliances can overheat, start a fire, and cause serious injuries.

#### **TEST YOUR GFCIs**

Outlets near a water source should be equipped with GFCIs, which help prevent shock and electrocution caused by ground faults. Test monthly to make sure they are working.


