The location of your thermostat can impact your HVAC system's ability to maintain an ideal indoor temperature. For best accuracy, thermostats should be placed in the center of the home, away from air vents, plumbing pipes, and exterior doors.

Avoid placing items like lamps and televisions near the thermostat. It can cause the HVAC to run longer than necessary. Avoid installing thermostats in places that tend to feel warmer or colder than the rest of your home. Don't place furniture in front of the thermostat. Manager's Article: Avoid Overloading Your Home's Electrical System

We're often told to not overload our schedules or our plates, but what about our home's electrical system? Turns out it is not a good idea, since doing so can cause damage and put your family at risk. Overloading the circuits in our home is sometimes not as obvious as cramming too many events on our calendar or overfilling our ice cream bowl (although it can be!). An overload simply means that



you have too many things running on one or more electrical circuits or pathways in your home and there is more demand than supply. When this happens, it can cause a minor inconvenience like damage to an appliance or a major one like a power outage or a fire.

To prevent overloading circuits, consider the following tips offered by Agralite Electric Cooperative and Safe Electricity:

- Although tempting, don't plug too many things in by using extension cords, power strips and multi-outlet converters. Overdoing it can overload and overheat a circuit.
- Be on the lookout for loose connections or damaged or corroded wires, which can also cause an overload or fire.
- If you continually upgrade your home with more lighting, appliances, and electronics, your home's circuits may not be able to handle the increased load. 900100
- Do not plug in multiple devices or appliances into an outlet at the same time, exceeding the outlet's capacity. Do not use extension cords with major appliances.

Consult an electrician if you notice the following:

- Warm or discolored outlets or outlet cover plates
- Flickering, dimming or blinking lights or any other strange lighting behavior
- Items in your home frequently cause a mild shock
- Other strange happenings like a burning odor that has no source or unusual sounds coming from outlets
- Fuses that blow or trip frequently

Do what you can to avoid overloading the circuits in your home. Although the majority of a home's electrical system is out of sight, out of mind, don't take overload symptoms lightly and consult an electrician with concerns.

The month of May is recognized as Electrical Safety month. At Agralite Electric Cooperative, we understand the importance of this in our day-to-day business. Safety is more than just a term to us, it's our number one priority to keep our employees safe, as well as the communities in which we serve. Agralite Electric Cooperative is governed by a seven-member Board of Directors elected by our membership. The cooperative's service territory is divided into seven districts with each district represented by a director who resides in that district. Directors elected serve a three-year term. This year we will have an election for directors for Districts 5, 6, and 7.

District 5 includes the townships of: Camp Lake, Kerkhoven, Kildare, Hayes, Cashel, Dublin, Pillsbury, Norway Lake, Louriston, and Lake Johanna.

District 6 includes the townships of: Tara, Clontarf, Benson, Marysland, Six Mile Grove, Torning, Swenoda, and Mandt.

District 7 includes the townships of: Hegbert, Fairfield, Shible, Moyer, Appleton, Edison, West Bank, Artichoke, Upper Akron, Lower Akron, Stevens, Synnes, and Kragero.

Any member meeting the qualifications as specified in the Bylaws of Agralite Electric Cooperative may become a candidate for election to the Board by submitting a written petition for nomination with the signatures of no less than 15 members who are residents of the district for which the election is being held. All voting will be done by mail. Ballots will be mailed to all Agralite voting members on record in these districts before the Annual Meeting. The election takes place at the Annual Meeting on June 22, 2023. 688802

Agralite Donates \$2,000 To Local Food Shelves During Minnesota FoodShare Month

Here at Agralite, we are always proud of what our Operation Round Up program does for our four-county region. In

March, Operation Round Up donated to all four of our local food shelves in Big Stone, Pope, Stevens, and Swift counties.

The Board of Directors at Agralite created a board policy to contribute unclaimed capital credit dollars to Agralite's Operation Round Up. A portion of those dollars go directly to our local food shelves, totaling \$2,000 for the month of March.

These dollars were delivered during Minnesota FoodShare month. During the March Campaign, donations are matched by Minnesota Food Share. The amount of matched dollars received is based on a percentage of how much was raised in the county. The more dollars raised, the more matching funds received.

MINUTES OF MEETING BOARD OF DIRECTORS March 2023


Board Chairman Orvin Gronseth Board Chairman Orvin Gronseth called a meeting of the Board of Directors of Agralite Electric Cooperative to order at 8:30 a.m., March 30, 2023. All members of the Board were present except Director Draeger who joined by Zoom. The agenda, minutes of the last meeting, the monthly disbursements, the payment of capital credits of deceased members, Work Order #540, Work Order #541, Work Order #542, and Special Equipment for February were approved.

Jonathan Messner, Manager of Member Services, reported on activities of his department for the month. He discussed load control for the month. He discussed plans to offer a North Dakota Energy Tour June 20-22 to 25 of our members, along with Meeker Cooperative and the Board approved it. He gave an update on Operation Round Up and stated the next meeting is set for April 13th. He discussed plans for the 2023 Annual Meeting.

Jenny Stryhn discussed margins for the month of February. She discussed FEMA payments and patronage earnings. She stated RUS started their audit reviewing Work Orders from October 2016 through January 2023. She discussed 2022 capital credit allocations and the Board approved it.

The financials were given by Jenny with a PowerPoint presentation.

Tom Hoffman, Manager of Engineering



& Operations, reported on activities of his department for the month. He discussed line crew projects and outages for the month. He gave an update on the two grant applications he has been working on. Tom brought forth 2023 Substation Maintenance, 2023 Pole Inspection, and 2023 Pad-Mount Inspection contracts with STAR Energy Services; 2023 Underground Construction contract with Integrity Construction; and 2023 Right of Way Cleaning and 2023 Foliar Spraying contracts with Carr's Tree Service, and the Board approved them all. Tom gave the safety report. Jenny Stryhn, General Manager/CEO, reviewed her report to the board. She discussed the recent meetings

that she attended and WAPA contracts. She gave an update on the City of Benson's feasibility study.

Ben Bratrud and Rich Macke, with Power Systems Engineering, joined the meeting to give a PowerPoint presentation to review the preliminary results of the Cost-of-Service Study they have been working on.

The April board meeting was set for the 27th. 1364701
